Indigenous movement risks lives to save their land

For the Indigenous Lenca people in Honduras, the land is their life. But the government is promoting dams, mines and other projects to exploit the land against the wishes of the Lenca.

MILPAH, the Independent Lenca Indigenous Movement of La Paz, is at the forefront of the struggle to protect their environment. MILPAH's members brave smear campaigns, death threats and physical assault. Are their attackers brought to justice? Rarely.

Their experience is typical for activists in Honduras because that country is one of the most dangerous places on earth to be a human rights defender. Women human rights defenders are at particular risk because their activism challenges stereotypes about the role of women in society.

Some are lucky enough to survive. Others, like Berta Cáceres, are not. She campaigned against a hydroelectric dam through a partner organization named COPINH. To stop her activism, she was murdered in 2016.

In October 2015, armed men stormed the home of MILPAH's Ana Miriam Romero. They were looking for her husband. They beat her up despite the fact that she was pregnant. Months later, her house was set on fire. In July 2016, two men threatened to kill her colleague Martín Gómez. Still, MILPAH vows to keep speaking out in order to protect the land on which they depend.

"We have no weapons, we have no money," says Martín. "But we do have a voice... and that has enabled us to make real progress."

MILPAH activists defend their land rights; we defend their rights. Tell Honduras to protect members of MILPAH.
